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## Getting started with Foglight APM

Foglight<sup>TM</sup> APM for Real User Experience (hereafter called Foglight APM) is an appliance-based application performance management solution. This *User Guide* walks you through using top-level APM dashboards to assess the experiences of your real end users as they navigate your monitored web sites and web applications.

Using this guide you can also learn how to create powerful, flexible searches to retrieve details directly from the Archiver database, enabling you to find answers to questions you have about your real users, and also to respond to any problems reported by real end users. From search results, you can replay hits, sequences, and sessions. You can also visualize aggregated details and metrics in maps and pivot charts. This guide is intended for Foglight users with the role of APM Operator or APM Administrator.

If you are new to application performance monitoring (APM), review the first two sections of this section for a quick introduction to APM. The rest of the section tells you how to find the APM dashboards in Foglight and which dashboards to look at first.

NOTE: This guide focuses on the real user experience and web request monitoring features included in Foglight APM. If you want to know more about Java<sup>™</sup> and .NET<sup>®</sup> monitoring functionality, see the Foglight for Application Operations User and Reference Guide.

#### Introducing APM

Application performance monitoring (APM) refers to a set of capabilities or technologies used by IT staff to support the incident and problem management processes on multi-tier applications. A comprehensive APM implementation generally includes technology that provides the following capabilities:

- · Real user experience monitoring
- Run-time application topology and execution path discovery, modeling, and display
- Transaction profiling across the technology stack
- Resource consumption and event monitoring within the discovered components
- Analytics

Foglight APM supports all these capabilities, and provides information to the right users at the right time through a set of role-oriented operational dashboards.

## Who uses Foglight APM

Although there is no single organizational alignment or uniformly agreed upon set of titles for the actual practitioners of APM, the following list identifies the some of the people who typically use Foglight APM:

- Application Support responsible for ensuring that application services are performing as expected.
   Identifies and triages service degradations or outages.
- Platform Specialist or Administrator responsible for the operation of an individual application component (for example, a database, a host, an application server, or a web server). Receives and responds to Foglight alarms on their platform or domain.
- Application Architect a senior escalation resource who is typically engaged by Application Support for assistance in locating the source of an application issue.
- Application Developer responsible for the application code. Uses the Foglight transactional
  performance dashboards to gain an understanding of the operational execution and performance of their
  code

In addition, a Foglight APM solution requires that one or more people take on responsibilities to design, implement, and maintain the solution. These people perform the following functions:


- Application Performance Manager designs and executes the APM strategy. Decides which of the organization's web sites and web applications to monitor.
- Foglight APM Administrator (Foglight role) configures Foglight to monitor web traffic for the selected web sites and web applications.
- Foglight Administrator (Foglight role) configures and manages Foglight, and performs administrative tasks, such as assigning user roles.

The Foglight APM Administrator assigns the role of APM Operator to everyone who needs access to the APM dashboards to evaluate real user activity.

## Finding the Foglight APM dashboards

To find the Foglight APM dashboards, in the Foglight navigation panel, under Dashboards, expand APM. Top-level APM dashboards enable you to view aggregated data by sequence, transaction, or geographical perspective. The Search dashboards enable you to search the Archiver database by hits, sessions, or sequences.

Figure 1. The APM dashboard menu.



The APM menu contains the following menu items:

**Geographical Perspective** — assess the performance of your web sites and applications by city, country, or region.

 ${\bf Search-search}$  the Archiver databases for details about hits, sequences, and sessions.

Sequence Explorer - assess the performance of important workflows in your web applications.

**Transactions** — monitor real user experiences with or without the other transactional data captured by Foglight.

Web Site and Endpoints — assess the performance of your web sites and endpoints.

### Getting started with Foglight APM

You can start assessing your real user experiences of your monitored web sites and web applications using any of the APM dashboards. Depending on your job function, however, you may be more interested in some results than others. The following table lists common getting started tasks, the dashboard to use, and the people who primarily use the dashboard.

TIP: If you are not seeing data for a web site or web application, ask the person with the Application Performance Manager function in your organization to consider monitoring the site/application.

## Monitoring transactions

A transaction occurs when a user or synthetic robot makes a request to a monitored application. Depending on the components in your installation, Foglight APM can capture and correlate transactional activity at multiple layers including:

- · Real/synthetic user behavior
- Web requests and responses
- Web servers and application servers
- Application code execution
- Database I/O
- Operating systems
- · Physical and virtual servers

With the Transactions dashboard, you can examine transactional data in the following ways:

- Fully-linked end-user to database transactions
- End-user transactions only (synthetic or real) aggregated by location or other details
- Application layer transactions only (Java<sup>™</sup> EE or .NET<sup>®</sup>)

The tiles on the Transactions dashboard represent different transactional views. Use the table below to quickly determine the type of transaction, then review Investigating real user APM transactions for an overview of how to drill down for more information.



For example, in the following image, the *Physician* group of tiles represents a real user perspective with pivot data. The performance summary on each tile includes an alarm state overview and other key metrics. For a full description of the metrics displayed on each type of tile, see APM tile and view reference.

NOTE: If some of the transactional data that you want to investigate is not available in your installation, you may need to install and configure additional Foglight components, such as Foglight for Java EE Technologies.

### Investigating real user APM transactions

The Transactions dashboard enables you to quickly identify if any transactions are having issues, to determine the magnitude of impact on the user population, and to view preliminary information that can aid in troubleshooting, including geographic discrepancies and whether the performance problems are in the back-end architecture, or the client-side browser or network.

① | TIP: The Service Operations Console includes a Transaction tab that displays transactions as services. The investigative workflow is similar to that described here.

#### To investigate a transaction:


- 1 On the navigation panel, under Dashboards, click APM > Transactions.
- 2 Click the down arrow in the **Show transactions in** box and select the transaction group you want to view from the list.
- TIP: Use the Tile Display Options, located in the action panel on the right, to control how many tiles are displayed and how data is rolled up for viewing. For more information, see Configuring display options.
  - 3 Locate a transaction group that is experiencing errors. For example, users in the *Physician* transaction group are experiencing poor performance. The health status icon indicates Warning status <u>A</u>. The transaction has not yet experienced a complete failure, but some component needs attention.

4 Click the name of the transaction in the title bar of the tile to drill down for more information.

The transaction detail view opens.



TIP: The detail view, and the tabs available, depend on the type of transaction selected. For example, drilling down on a Real User (APM) tile opens a performance detail view (as shown), while drilling down on a pivot result opens a summary view with tiles for each type of pivot you have defined (see Pivot Breakdown detail view for details).

The Hits tab and Pages tab summarize the pivots available from the hit analyzers configured for the transaction.

5 Click the Pages tab. Here you can see that the Warning status has been triggered by the Service Level Attainment for Back End dropping below an acceptable threshold.

6 Click Find Related Hits to investigate further.

The Search Hits page opens. From here, you can continue your investigation using the Search dashboards.

① | NOTE: The execution times in this view are aggregated for the current timeslice.

## Investigating application server transactions

The Transactions dashboard allows you to visualize application-specific transaction data (that is, Java<sup>™</sup> EE or .NET<sup>®</sup> transactions) with or without end user data. Use this dashboard to quickly identify if any transactions are having issues, and to view preliminary information that can aid in troubleshooting, including geographic discrepancies and whether the performance problems are in the back-end architecture, or the client-side browser or network


TIP: The Service Operations Console includes a Transaction tab that displays transactions as services. The investigative workflow is similar to that described here.

In order to populate the Transactions dashboard or the SOC Transactions tab with data from Foglight for Java EE Technologies or Foglight for Microsoft .NET (version 5.9.1 or later), ensure that you used the appropriate procedures.

#### To investigate an application server transaction:

- 1 On the navigation panel, under Dashboards, click APM > Transactions.
- 2 Click the down arrow in the **Show transactions in** box and select the transaction group you want to view from the list.
  - TIP: Use the Tile Display Options, located in the action panel on the right, to control how many tiles are displayed and how data is rolled up for viewing. For more information, see Configuring display options.
- 3 Locate an application server transaction group.


Figure 5. An example of a bottleneck appearing on a transaction group tile



In this example, *MedRec1Server1* is causing a bottleneck. It is performing poorly, as indicated by the warning icon ( ).

4 Click the name of the transaction (/physician-web/physician (phys...)) in the title bar of the tile to drill down for more information.

The transaction detail view opens.




- 5 On the Response Time Breakdown tab you can see the execution time for a request as it passes through the various components that are included in the transaction group.
  - **O** NOTE: The execution times in this view are aggregated for the current timeslice.
    - The upper portion of the tab provides a list of components, with average execution times for the current timeslice, and a sparkline that illustrates the average execution time during the selected time range.
    - The lower portion of the tab provides the same average execution time information in a dependency path view. The average execution time for each component is displayed below the icon for the component.
    - Application servers are clustered in the dependency view. The list of components provides a tree view of servers included in the cluster.
    - The dark grey arrows (*Paths in the current timeslice*) indicate the path taken by at least one request in the current timeslice (that is, the most recent sample period reported by the agent).
    - The light grey arrows (*Paths in current time range*) indicate the path taken by at least one request in the time range selected with the zonar (for example, the last four hours).
    - A yellow exclamation mark indicates that an error has occurred within the marked component during the current timeslice.

Here you can see that the execution time for the application server MedRec1Server1 is longer than it should be to meet service levels.

- 6 From here you can:
  - Click Explore Breakdowns to open the Response Time Breakdown Explorer.
  - Click Explore Errors to open the Error Breakdown Explorer.
  - Click the Application Infrastructure tab to investigate the application components. This tab displays a tile for each component. In this example, there is a host (medrecapp1.example.domain) and an application server (MedRec1Server1).

Here you can see that the application server has a warning related to one request.

7 Click the name of the application component in the title bar of the tile to drill down for more information.

For example, click *medrecapp1.example.domain* to investigate the host performance in the Host detail view. Or click *MedRec1Server1* to investigate the requests in the Application Server detail view.

## Configuring display options

You can customize the layout of the Transactions dashboard by selecting the appropriate options in the Tile Display Options dialog box. Use these options to control the total number of tiles, the order in which they appear, and the rollup options for multiple FTR locations (if applicable).


NOTE: These settings apply on a per-user basis.

#### To configure display options:

- 1 With the APM > Transactions dashboard open in the display area, open the action panel on the right side of the browser interface.
- 2 Click Tile Display Options.

The Tile Display Options dialog box opens.

3 Configure the following options, as required.

- The Enable Grouping option groups user tiles together by transaction name. By default, groups are sorted by their severity first, then by their name. This grouping is not affected by the Sort Order options.
- The Show at most *n* tiles or groups setting determines the total number of tiles displayed. Synthetic transaction locations are first rolled up using the rollup criteria below. After that, the total number of tiles is determined by the maximum number of tiles that you specify.
- You can roll up synthetic transactions locations into multi-location FTR (Synthetics) tiles based on the criteria below, in the following order:
  - the maximum number of single-location Synthetics tiles, using the Rollup if there are more than n FTR tiles setting, and then
  - the maximum number of locations per script, using the When there are more than n location(s) for a script setting.
- Use the Sort Order options to sort the tiles by either type (Real End Users first) or alarm severity (Sort by Alarm State).
- For example, you can configure the Transactions tab to display a maximum of ten tiles sorted by the alarm state (highest severity first).
- The Show Transaction Pivots option controls whether transaction pivots are displayed. If you do not want to see Pivot tiles, clear this check box.
- The Rollup Pivots option controls whether pivot data are grouped together or rendered individually. For example, Foglight can roll up all pivots such as Chrome<sup>™</sup>, Firefox<sup>®</sup>, Internet Explorer<sup>®</sup>, and Opera<sup>™</sup> into a single web browsers pivot tile.

#### 4 Click Save.

The Tile Display Options dialog box closes and the Transactions dashboard refreshes, reflecting the updated display options.

# Viewing real user activity from a geographical perspective

The Geographical Perspective dashboard displays the real user activity for a selected transaction based on performance problems and errors, total traffic, response time, and other factors. The default view provides a summary for the top 100 locations for the selected transaction. A list of performance-related measurements (such as, "Show locations with the most: Hits" or "Show locations with the highest: Hit Response Times") help you find performance patterns and problems with geographical features.

NOTE: If the Geographical Perspectives dashboard shows the message "There is no data to display," an APM Administrator needs to update hit analyzers to populate the map with data. For more information, see "Publishing hit metrics for use in the Geographical Perspective dashboard" in the Foglight APM Administration and Configuration Guide.

The Geographical Perspective dashboard is divided into three panes. The pane on the left contains lists of: available aggregation types, timeslices, and measurements. The center pane displays either a map, if the *Map* tab is selected, or a list of results in a tabular format, if the *List* tab is selected. The pane on the right provides graphical results from the measurements, and the option to drill down for more information.


NOTE: If you are using a version 5.6.4 Management Server, only the List tab is available. The Map tab requires Management Server 5.6.5 or later.

If you are using Internet Explorer® (IE) 8 or earlier, only the List tab is available.

#### To view real end user activity in a geographical perspective:

- 1 On the navigation panel, under Dashboards, click APM > Geographical Perspective.
- 2 Select a transaction from the **Transactions** list at the bottom of the navigation panel.

Figure 9. Navigation panel showing a list of Transactions




The dashboard display updates.

- 3 On the left side of the dashboard, select an Aggregation Type: top ten by city, country, or region.
- Select a Measurement from the list to view the related transaction data. The map and right pane update based on your selection.

For example: select Show locations with the highest: Page Response Times.

Figure 10. Showing locations with the highest: Page Response Times




The map updates to indicate the locations that are experiencing the highest average page response times in the selected timeslice. The right pane displays a chart of the page processing time for the entire transaction (all locations), and the top five locations are listed in a table below the graph and timeslice selector.

Double-click anywhere on the map to zoom in on that location. You can also use the zoom tool in the map pane to zoom in or out. You can move the map in any direction by clicking and holding the left mouse button and dragging the cursor.

The fill-level of each pin on the map shows how close that location is to the maximum value in the current timeslice. In this example, Seattle has the highest response time, so its pin appears full.

- 5 Select a timeslice from the **Timeslice** list, or use the forward or back arrows to step through the available timeslices.
  - ① | TIP: The vertical blue bar on the graph indicates the currently selected timeslice.
- 6 Click Transaction Detail (in the lower right corner of the right pane) to open the Summary view for the transaction. For more information about this view, see Real User (APM) Performance detail view.
- 7 Hover your cursor over a pin to open a quick view of metrics for that location.

8 Click a pin to view a graph of the average page response time for that location in the right pane.

The Similar Locations list, in the right pane, updates to show locations that are ranked near the selected location in the current category. These are locations that have similar performance measurements to the selected location. Click any location name in the list to view the graph for that location.

9 Click Location Detail to drill down to detailed information for the selected location.




Figure 13. Detailed information for a selected location

The Location Detail view provides a table of measurements in context that helps you understand how the selected location is behaving relative to other locations during the selected timeslice and aggregation period.

Measurements for the selected location are sorted in order of severity.

The value in the Highest Rank column indicates the highest ranking that the selected location attained at any point during the selected time range. The time range may span multiple timeslices. For example, at some time during the selected time range, Seattle had the highest page response time of all locations. Therefore, for the measurement Page Response Time, Seattle's Highest Rank is 1 (first).

The value in the Current Rank column indicates the selected location's current ranking for the selected timeslice. This may or may not be the same as its highest rank, depending on when the peak value for the location occurred. In this example, Seattle is ranked second for the Current Rank for Bandwidth Usage. That is, during the currently selected timeslice, Seattle has the second highest page response time

- 10 Click any location's name in either the Similar Locations list or the Top Ranked Location column to open a detail view for that location for comparison.
- 11 To view the transaction data for the selected location in the appliance, click More Details.

The Search Hits page opens. From here, you can continue your investigation using the Search dashboards.

## Assessing real user experiences during key sequences

Sequences enable you to assess the experiences of your real users as they navigate a series of predefined steps within your web site or application. Using the aggregated data in the tiles on the Sequence Explorer dashboard, you can identify trends in how users navigated a selected sequence.

NOTE: APM Administrators define the sequences that appear in the Sequence Explorer. For more information, see "Introducing sequence analyzers" in the Foglight APM Administration and Configuration Guide.

You can use sequences for the following kinds of situations:

- For a commercial web application, a shopping sequence may reveal that fewer shoppers than expected purchased the objects in their shopping cart. By drilling down on the tile with the most exits, you can analyze the hits that occurred within the sequence. You may find that shoppers became frustrated with the time it took for the checkout page to load.
- For an intranet timesheet application, a timesheet update sequence may show that a significant number of employees abandoned an update at the same step. On further investigation, you may find that the affected employees received error pages.
- Part of developing web sites and applications includes identifying the critical paths within the application and optimizing the performance of those workflows. You can use sequences to monitor performance of those workflows over time and alert when problems arise.

You can perform the following tasks:

- Introducing the Sequence Explorer dashboard
- Investigating sequence activity
- · Changing the timeslice and the time range
- Creating custom Sequence Explorer dashboards

### Introducing the Sequence Explorer dashboard


In the Sequence Explorer dashboard, you can explore the aggregated data for all events in a sequence and identify trends in how users navigated the sequence.

#### To open this dashboard:

On the navigation panel, under Dashboards, click APM > Sequence Explorer.

The Sequence Explorer dashboard appears, displaying the Entire Period Timeslice details (by default) for a sequence that reflects a key workflow in your web site or application.

The dashboard contains the following components.

Table 3. Sequence Explorer dashboard components

| Component          | Description  |

| Sequences Selector | Select the sequence that you want to explore.  |
| Timeslice          | Select a timeslice to review. To view more timeslices, increase the time range. To see previous timeslice intervals, move the time range to that particular time. For more information, see Changing the timeslice and the time range  |
| Time Range         | Controls the period of time represented in the dashboard. The default is the last four hours.  |
| Event Charts       | Displays the number of users in the event over the selected Time Range. To identify timeslices of interest, use the charts to look for spikes representing a high number of exits compared to the number of entries into the event. Then you can select the timeslice from the Timeslice list, and display data from that period in the event tiles. |

| Sequence Search    | View the list of sessions during which users navigated the defined sequence. The aggregated values shown in the Sequence Explorer are based on these sequence attempts. For more information about the Search Sequences dashboard, see Searching and investigating sequences.  |

### Investigating sequence activity

The following workflow describes how to select a sequence to display in the Sequences Explorer and suggests one way of identifying events that warrant further investigation.

#### To explore sequences:

1 On the navigation panel, under Dashboards, click APM > Sequence Explorer.


The Sequence Explorer dashboard opens, displaying content for the entire period of the time line available (default Timeslice).



- 2 On the navigation panel, under Sequences (same level as Dashboards), select a sequence from the list or use the search field to find and select a named sequence.
  - The selected sequence appears. The data in the dashboard represents the entire time range. You can focus on a slice of time within the time range by selecting a time from the Timeslice list. For more information, see Changing the timeslice and the time range.
- To investigate why users exit the sequence at an event, click an event tile with a high number of exits.

  The Event tile dialog box opens, displaying top-level details for the target sequence events.




- 4 To evaluate individual user experiences, navigate to the expanded details in a Search Sequences dashboard.
  - a On the Event tile dialog box, click a number to display the filtered Search Sequences results. In the proceeding example image, clicking 20 (in the row under the Period) displays the 20 sequences during which users exited the sequence at this event. Figure 17. Session Explorer dashboard









## Changing the timeslice and the time range

By default, the Sequence Explorer shows details for the Entire Period Timeslice. You can change the time range (zonar) and select a different timeslice to focus your investigation.

Selecting a five minute timeslice enables you to review the activity during that time in the Event tiles. The Event tiles allow you to drill into time slices that had particularly high exits. In the example below, one user started an event and also exited that event during the 8:45 - 8:50 AM timeslice.

Figure 21. Changing the timeslice for the Sequence Explorer




Changing the time range updates the information in the Event charts. By default, the time range is set to four hours. You can change the time range to represent a time period in the past, or to increase or decrease the range of the current time period. For example, if you are interested in locating a sequence that occurred in the previous week, set the time range to that time frame. For more information about using the time range (zonar), see the Foglight User Help > Online-Only Topics > Zonar and Time Range topic.

## Creating custom Sequence Explorer dashboards

In addition to using the Sequence Explorer dashboard, you can create custom sequence events dashboards for your specific needs. These dashboards can contain any combination of tables and charts that you find useful. The custom dashboards that you create are located under My Dashboards in the navigation panel.

In the following image, APM > Sequences > All Sequences > Funnel-DM > Events data elements are dragged from the Action panel Data tab and positioned on the display area, using the Sequence Event Funnel template.

# Monitoring the performance of web sites and endpoints

If a physical or virtual web server experiences issues, or if a web site or web application has performance issues such as memory leaks, then real users are likely to experience performance issues as well. Network administrators and application owners need to be able to assess the performance of web sites and applications in real time and through historical data.

## Introducing the Web Sites and Endpoints dashboard


The Web Sites and Endpoints dashboard displays information about hit performance by web sites or by endpoints. Endpoints mark the termination or completion of a session or connection.

#### To open this dashboard:

• On the navigation panel, under Dashboards, click APM > Web Sites and Endpoints.

The first time you open this dashboard, the Busiest Web Sites view displays details about the top 50 busiest sites active in the period. The selector contains a list of all active sites.

The dashboard contains the following components:

# Exploring the top busiest web sites or endpoints

The Busiest Web Site and Busiest Endpoint views are useful for understanding which of your monitored applications are busiest in terms of volume. Volume is the total size of all HTTP messages sent by both clients and servers, including content and headers for both requests and responses, during the time range. The views contain up to 50 of the busiest sites endpoints active in the selected time range.

In addition to the Volume metric, the Busiest view contains the timing metrics used to measure hit performance: End-to-End Time, Client Time, Network Delay, or Back End Time. For a single hit, the End-to-End Time is the sum of the other three metrics. In this view however, the values represent average values for all hits over the time period. For more information about hit metrics, see the *Foglight APM Reference Guide*.

NOTE: Sorting the table by one of the timing metrics does not recalculate the top 50 sites endpoints, it simply reorders the current results by the selected metric.

The following walkthrough assumes a scenario where all the top 50 sites are operating within expected parameters, that is, no alarms. For an approach to alarms, see Exploring alarms on web sites or endpoints.

#### To explore the top busiest sites or endpoints:

- 1 In the navigation panel, under Dashboards, click APM > Web Sites and Endpoints.
  The time range and selected tile are the same as the last time the dashboard was opened.
- 2 To show data for a different time period, set the Time Range.
- 3 To change the quick view, click the top part of the desired tile.

  In the quick view, the Selector displays a list of monitored sites|endpoints active in the time period, ordered first by severity and then alphabetically. The top-level node, *Summary*, is selected and the Busiest view shows up to 50 of the busiest sites|endpoints.
- 4 Sort the table by **Volume** to see the busiest sites endpoints in terms of the total size of all HTTP messages sent and received.
- 5 Sort the table by End-to-End Time to see which of the busiest sites endpoints also contributed to the longest average hit download times. Scan the values for the other timing metrics to determine where time is being spent: on the client side, traversing the network, or on the server side.
- 6 Next Step: Investigating a web site or endpoint

## Exploring alarms on web sites or endpoints

When the performance of a monitored site or endpoint meets one of the conditions defined in a multiple-severity rule, Foglight triggers an alarm and sets the site's or endpoint's state icon to indicate the severity level of the performance issue. You should review any high-severity alarms that show up in the time range you are interested in.

TIP: You can modify the conditions in multiple-severity rules to better suit your environment. For more information, search for "Rules" in the online help.

The most important alarms to take action on are those that occur on a site or endpoint in the Busiest Web Sites or Busiest Endpoints views. The Alarm view highlights these sites | endpoints. In addition, any high severity (Fatal and Critical) alarms outside of the top 50 should be assessed. These alarms appear at the top of the selector list.

This walkthrough recommends setting the quick view and looking at the Alarm view to see if there are any alarms in the top 50 sites|endpoints. If you prefer to restrict the quick view to show one set of alarms, such as all Fatal alarms, start your investigation by clicking a severity icon on a tile.

#### To explore alarms in the Busiest list:

- 1 In the navigation panel, under Dashboards, click APM > Web Sites and Endpoints. The time range and selected tile are the same as the last time the dashboard was opened.
- 2 To show data for a different time period, set the Time Range.
- 3 Click the top half of the tile that has the highest number of sites endpoints with the most severe errors. The quick view updates. If there are any alarms in the top 50, they appear in the Alarm view.
- In the Alarm view, assess all high-severity alarms.
  - a Start with the highest severity alarm in the list.
  - b Review the alarm details to understand the issue.
  - c Take action by resolving the issue yourself or by notifying the appropriate person.
  - d Repeat to resolve other alarms in order of severity.
    - ① | TIP: For Warnings, depending on the issue, an appropriate action may be to acknowledge
- 5 If the other tile shows alarms, select it and repeat step 4.
- If you want, explore alarms that are not in the top 50.
  - a On a tile, click the state icon representing the worst severity. The Selector displays all sites endpoints with that alarm. The Results view shows the subset of the top 50 busiest sites endpoints with that alarm (if any).
  - b In the selector list, select an alarm that was not in the top 50.
  - c Assess the alarm and take action as required.
- 7 Next Step: Investigating a web site or endpoint

## Investigating a web site or endpoint

When you need more information than the Busiest view or Alarm view provides, select the site or endpoint of interest. The Results view changes to show a set of charts containing hit performance, page performance, warnings, and errors for the time range. You can use these charts to discover whether the average times reflects a consistent level of performance, or if the performance is uneven. From here, even more data is available by clicking a chart or the Explore button.

Many things can cause a sudden change in performance or errors. Here are a few possibilities:

- A page is deleted but there are still references to it, causing page errors.
- Changes to an application's code causes slower responses to hit requests.
- An ISP is experiencing higher than normal volume resulting in higher client times.
- Web servers are temporarily down in a server farm, and the remaining servers are overloaded.
- A change occurs in the infrastructure, such as a vMotion® that moves an application to a less responsive

#### To investigate a web site:

1 Click a site endpoint.

Charts reflect performance for the time period.

- 2 Look for clues to issues, such as:
  - A sudden change in performance over the time range.
  - An onset of warnings and errors where none existed in previous time ranges.
  - Consistently higher than expected values for one of the metrics.
- 3 If you need more details to understand the issue, click Explore.
  - A dashboard opens for the selected site | endpoint.
- 4 Review overall performance in the Summary tab. The Summary tab is similar to the preceding view, but adds the following metrics for the time period: End to End Time, Capture Rate, and Volume.
- 5 To investigate hit performance, click the Hits tab. The Hits tab displays detailed hit performance and hit volume metrics plus request and response code metrics for the time period.

## Troubleshooting an excessive number of monitored web sites

If you have an excessive number of web sites reported in this dashboard, consider aggregating data capture for similar sites. For example, if you attribute the data collected for alias sites to the primary site, then only the primary site appears in this dashboard. In general, data aggregation makes the data more manageable and more meaningful in all dashboards.

To define data aggregations, an APM Administrator creates domain rules. In a troubleshooting scenario, where you want a quick way to aggregate data for a large number of similar sites, use a regular expression that matches multiple sites and map the sites to a fictitious (or real) domain name. For information about defining domain rules, see "Managing domain rules" in the *Foglight APM Administration and Configuration Guide*.

① | NOTE: Only data captured after the domain rule is created is aggregated. Historical data is not affected.

#### Example

Consider a scenario where all sites of interest are identified in the dashboard by domain names, but Foglight APM is also monitoring a proliferation of IP addresses that are of little or no interest. The following regular expression matches all IP addresses and aggregates them under a single fictitious domain called *myOtherSites.com*. This rule eliminates the "noise" generated by all the extraneous sites and allows you to focus on what really interests you.

## Searching APM data

Foglight captures, decrypts, analyzes, and stores a vast amount of data about how real users navigate your web sites and applications, the performance of the web servers and application servers in your infrastructure, and the performance of Java $^{\text{m}}$  applications and .NET $^{\text{m}}$  applications. This data is stored as details in the Archiver database.

You can see the details when you drill down from the top-level dashboards (Geographical Perspectives, Sequence Explorer, and Web Sites and Endpoints dashboards). In the top-level dashboards, you view aggregated metrics derived from the details. For example, in the Sequence Explorer, you see exit counts that represent a total for all users who performed the same sequence of steps. When you drill-down on a tile, you can navigate to the expanded details in a Search dashboard. So for the sequence, you can drill down to the captured sequences to evaluate individual user experiences.

You may come across situations where you want to search the Archiver database directly using your own search criteria. For example, if a real user reports having issues with your web site, you can search for the session and replay it to see what your user experienced. Each type of search has its own dashboard and offers a simple search and an expert search. You can save searches and rerun them later. You can also run the last search and clear search results.

From search results, you can replay a hit, sequence, or session to see what your real user experienced while navigating your site or application. You can also view search results in a map or pivot chart. For more information, see Replaying sessions, hits, and sequences and Visualizing search results.

You can search for hits by time range, hit detail, analyzer, content category, or some combination of these parameters. You can also define match conditions to create very specific searches.

In the Search Hits dashboard, you can run a simple search or an expert search to find hits. You can also rerun the last search, save a search, load and run a saved search, or clear search results.

# Defining simple searches for hits

A simple search enables you to search for hits using the most commonly-used search criteria. If you want to search for hits that occurred within a particular time range or hits that match some set of conditions, you need to define an expert search instead.

#### To define and run a simple hit search:

- 1 In the navigation panel, under Dashboards, click APM > Search > Hits.
- 2 Click Simple Search.
- 3 Specify the search criteria.

### Defining expert searches for hits

You can run a search using the same options as a simple search. You can also define a time range or some set of conditions.

#### To define and run an expert hit search:

- 1 In the navigation panel, under Dashboards, click APM > Search > Hits.
- 2 Click Expert Search.

If you defined a simple search before switching to an expert search, the Expert Search dialog box displays the same values for the options you selected in the Simple Search dialog box.

3 Specify the search criteria.



# Understanding search hits results

When the search ends, the results are displayed in the Search Hits table. The search parameters appear above the table. If no hits matched the search parameters, the table is empty.

TIP: By default, a hit search returns a maximum of 1,000 hits. An APM Administrator can change this limit using the *Hit Search Result Limit* setting in the Configure Advanced Options > Settings dashboard.

## Investigating hit results

This workflow walks through how to use the data in the Search Hits table and how to drill down to more details about a specific hit or the session to which it belongs. Your own investigative workflow will depend on the problems you are trying to resolve.


NOTE: Typically you want to design searches that limit the search results in a meaningful way, such as finding all hits that triggered a hit analyzer or all hits with an end-to-end time greater than 10 seconds. A restrictive search makes your investigation work much easier.

#### To review hit search results:

- 1 From the Search Hits dashboard, run a search.
  - Running saved searches

When a hit belongs to a session, the Session Explorer and Session Detail View i icons appear in the Sessions column. You can view the selected hit within the context of a session and assess the other hits that occurred within the session. For more information about using these views, see Investigating issues.


2 Choose an interesting HTML hit to investigate.

For example, choose a hit that displays one or more of the following characteristics:

- **Status**—look for icons other than the Normal icon. A hit can be set to a non-normal status due to a client or browser error code or when the hit matched some set of conditions defined within a hit analyzer. APM Administrators define and manage hit analyzers.
- **Code**—look for client error codes (400+) or server error codes (500+). Remember though that Web 2.0 applications may not return error codes, because they redirect users to a helpful error page rather than a generic error page. In this case, you need to rely on analyzers catching the errors and setting the hit status to non-normal.
- **End-to-End Time**—very high end-to-end times may indicate a problem with the amount of content on a page or a very slow web server.
- Back End Time—very high back end times may indicate a problem with the web server.
- **Exception**—any exceptions should be reported to the application developer.
- 3 To display the contents of the hit, click Replay 🔜 in the Hits column.

If the hit is an HTML page, you see an approximation of the page as viewed by the user. If you select an image, the Replay window shows the image. If you select a text file such as a CSS file or a JavaScript file, the browser attempts to download the file. In some cases, content may be missing. For more information, see Understanding what happens when content is unavailable.


Figure 26. Hit Preview



4 To drill down to the hit details, click **Hit Detail View (!**) in the Hits column. You can open the view in the current browser window or a new window.

The Hit Detail View opens, displaying details and performance metrics for the hit. As you review the details, you may want to collapse the views you are not interested in. Then you can focus on the details of interest. Click the Client Detail, Metric Updates, and Other Information links to view additional information about the hit.

- 5 If you notice something in the hit details or metrics that looks interesting, you may want to view all the hits by this detail to see if a pattern emerges.
  - For example, you may suspect that a slow End-to-End Time is typical for the user's region or service provider. To test your hypothesis, you can create a pivot chart for End-to-End Time by Region or ISP. To create a pivot chart, return to the search results. Click **Pivot** . For more information, see Viewing search results in pivot charts.
- 6 To map your results geographically, return to the search results. Click Map . For more information, see Viewing search results in a map.

# Searching and investigating sessions

You can search for sessions by time range, session identifier, user name, the status of sessions (active or ended), or some combination of these parameters. You can also define match conditions to create very specific searches

In the Search Sessions dashboard, you can run a simple search or an expert search to find sessions. You can also rerun the last search, save a search, load and run a saved search, or clear search results.

# Defining simple searches for sessions

A simple search enables you to search for sessions using the most frequently-used search criteria. If you want to search for sessions that occurred within a particular time range or hits that match some set of conditions, you need to define an expert search instead.


#### To define and run a simple session search:

- 1 In the navigation panel, under Dashboards, click APM > Search > Sessions.
- 2 Click Simple Search.
- 3 Specify the search criteria.

# Defining expert searches for sessions

You can run a search using the same options as a simple search. You can also define a time range or some set of conditions, such as session with a specified duration.

NOTE: The Archiver stores session duration in milliseconds, but the UI displays it in seconds. Therefore, if you search sessions based on duration, you may see results that appear to fall outside the search criteria. For example, defining a match condition with "Session Duration > 10" may return search results that appear to match "Session Duration >= 10". In this case, a session that appears to be equal to 10 seconds actually has a duration greater than 10 seconds, such as 10.4322 seconds, but the UI does not display the decimal places.

#### To define and run an expert session search:

- 1 In the navigation panel, under Dashboards, click APM > Search > Session.
- 2 Click Expert Search.


If you defined a simple search before switching to an expert search, the Expert Search dialog box displays the same values for the options you selected in the Simple Search dialog box.

3 Specify the search criteria.



# Understanding search sessions results

When the search ends, the results are displayed in the Search Sessions table. The search parameters appear above the table. If no sessions matched the search parameters, the table is empty.

TIP: By default, a session search returns a maximum of 200 sessions. An APM Administrator can change this limit using the *Session Search Result Limit* setting in the Configure Advanced Options > Settings dashboard.

# Investigating issues reported during real user sessions

When a helpdesk receives reports from real users (internal staff or external users) regarding unexpected errors or slow page performance, technical support staff can use Foglight APM search features to find the problem user sessions. By reviewing what your users experienced, you can form an understanding of what may be causing the problem. You can then escalate the issue to the appropriate person (developer or administrator) for resolution.

### Finding the user session

You can identify the real user's session using one or more of the following pieces of information as search criteria.

- **Time period**—find out the time period during which the session was active, or find out when the user started or ended their session.
- **Session identifier**—if a user's browser captures the session identifier, instruct the user how to retrieve that identifier.
- **User name**—for applications that require a login, request the user's user name.
- **Client IP address**—for an internal application, request the user's client IP address.
- **Subnet**—for an intranet application, find out the subnet used by the application.
- City—if no other identifying details are known, you may need to search sessions by the user's city.
- Page visited before starting session—this information can be useful for picking the correct session out of a list of session search results. You can look at the Initial Referer column to find the page the user visited before beginning the session.

The following workflow assumes that you have the session identifier or user name. If you do not, you need to define an expert search and create match conditions using one or more of the other details as your search criteria. For instructions, see Defining expert searches for sessions.

#### To find the user session:

- 1 Gather information about the user's session.
- 2 Log into Foglight.
- 3 In the navigation panel, under Dashboards, click APM > Search > Sessions.
- 4 Click Simple Search.
  - a Specify the time period during which the user experienced issues. From the first list, select the state of the session (started, in progress, or ended) during the time period. From the second list, select the time period.

- TIP: If no other options are set, the search returns all sessions of the selected state that occurred within the specified time period.
- b Optional—specify whether the session is currently active or complete.
- c Specify either the session identifier or the user name, whichever you have.
- d Click Search.

The Search Sessions results table displays the search results.

If you have only one match, you can begin investigating the session now. Otherwise, you need to pick out the user's session from the results list. If you know the session start time, end time, or the page that the user was looking at before beginning the session, you should be able to select the correct session by looking to those columns in the Search Sessions results table.

### Investigating issues

You use the Session Explorer to investigate issues. The Session Explorer contains:


- · Complete hit details for the entire HTTP request and response for any hit in the session
- A visual presentation of each page as originally served by the web server
- A visual presentation of each page with user input (forms/links)
- · The original HTML source for each page generated by the web server
- Any errors (HTML or other source) detected by analyzers
- Session and sequence durations, hit counts, and other aggregate details
- NOTE: This workflow starts from the Search Session results table. However, the process is similar when you drill down from a Real User tile in the Transaction dashboard or when you run a search for hits or sequences.

This workflow presents one way to investigate issues. Your investigation should be guided by the type of problem you are investigating. For example, you may want to skip the session replay and go straight to the hit inspector.

#### To investigate an issue:


- 1 In the row containing the issue you want to investigate, click Session Explorer 2.
  - The Session Explorer opens. When opened from the Search Hits results table, the hit displayed is the selected hit. When opened from the Search Sequences or Search Sessions results table, the hit details represent the first hit in the selected sequence or session.
- 2 If not already selected, click the Replay tab.
  - The content associated with the selected hit is displayed. Look for navigation clues in the Referer/Navigated To sections above the page content. The Details sections may provide additional information. You can switch between Captured Hits (to see all hits) and Page Visit Order (HTML pages). Select different hits in the user's path to view the content they saw.
    - IMPORTANT: Some content may not be shown in the response replay. For more information on missing content and using the features in the Replay tab, see Replaying sessions, hits, and sequences.

- 3 To investigate a page further, click the Hit Inspector tab.
- 4 In the list of hits in the session table, look for hits that exhibit symptoms of the problem, such as a hit that displays one or more of the following characteristics:
  - **Status**—look for icons other than the Normal icon. A hit can be set to a non-normal status due to a client or browser error code or when the hit matched some set of conditions defined within a hit analyzer. APM Administrators define and manage hit analyzers.
  - **Code**—look for client error codes (400+) or server error codes (500+). Remember though that Web 2.0 applications may not return error codes, because they redirect users to a helpful error page rather than a generic error page. In this case, you need to rely on analyzers catching the errors and setting the hit status to non-normal.
  - **End-to-End Time**—very high end-to-end times may indicate a problem with the amount of content on a page or a very slow web server.
  - Back End Time—very high back end times may indicate a problem with the web server.
  - **Exception**—any exceptions should be reported to the application developer.
- 5 After you identify the hits that contribute to the problem, select each hit in turn and scan the hit details to look for clues about what might be causing the performance issues. Additional details and metrics are available by clicking Metric Updates, Client Details, or Other Information.

For example, if the hit status is non-normal but the error code is 200, you can review the hit's details to find out which hit analyzers were triggered. You can pass this information on to an APM Administrator for further investigation and resolution. If the back end time is high, you may want to check the health of the web sites and endpoints in your monitored environment, especially if you are having many users reporting similar issues.

- 6 If you suspect that poor performance is localized to a city, region, or country, you can create a map using the search results. In the search results, click **Map** . For more information, see Viewing search results in a map.
- 7 If many real users are reporting the same issue, it may be helpful to create a pivot chart that aggregates data for all users. Return to the search results. Click Pivot . For more information, see Viewing search results in pivot charts.

# Searching and investigating sequences

If your APM Administrator configured sequence analyzers, you can search for sequences created by a selected analyzer. You can also specify a time range, sequence state (active or completed), session identifier, sequence status (OK, warning, error), or some combination of these search parameters. You can define match conditions to create very specific searches.

NOTE: If you want a high-level, graphical view of aggregated sequence data, start from the Sequence Explorer dashboard. From there, you can navigate to the Search Sequences dashboard described in this section. For more information, see Assessing real user experiences during key sequences.

In the Search Sequences dashboard, you can run a simple search or an expert search to find sequences. You can also rerun the last search, save a search, load and run a saved search, or clear search results.



A simple search returns sequences that were active at the time period you specify. If you are not the designer of the sequence analyzers, you should find out the names of the sequence analyzers that track the sequences you are interested in. APM Administrators define sequence analyzers.

#### To define and run an simple sequence search:

- 1 In the navigation panel, under Dashboards, click APM > Search > Sequences.
- 2 Click Simple Search.
- 3 Select a sequence analyzer that captures the sequences you want to find. The options for the sequence analyzer appear.
- 4 Under Find sequences that, select the time criteria for the sequences.
  - TIP: An APM Administrator can increase or decrease the maximum time range displayed in the time range list through the Configure Advanced Options > Settings dashboard. See the Search Time Range Limit option under the Archiver Query Settings.

### Defining expert searches for sequences

You can run an expert search using the same options as a simple search. You can also specify whether the sequence was active or completed. You can further refine the search by specifying a particular user session, sequence status, or match conditions.

If you are not the designer of the sequence analyzers, you should find out the names of the sequence analyzers that track the sequences you are interested in. APM Administrators define sequence analyzers.

#### To define and run an expert sequence search:

- 1 In the navigation panel, under Dashboards, click APM > Search > Sequences.
- 2 Click Expert Search.


If you defined a simple search before switching to an expert search, the Expert Search dialog box displays the same sequence analyzer and the same time criteria you selected in the Simple Search dialog box. Advanced options are also displayed.

3 Select a sequence analyzer, and then specify the search criteria.



# Investigating sequence results

This workflow walks through how to use the data in the Search Sequences table. You may want to save your searches so that you can quickly rerun them to monitor performance on an ongoing basis.

#### To investigate sequences from search results:

- 1 From the Search Sequences dashboard, run a search.
  - Running saved searches
  - · Repeating the last search
  - Defining simple searches for sequences
  - Defining expert searches for sequences

When a search matches sequences in the database, the results table displays the sequences.

- 2 To identify sequences that may warrant further investigation, review the following columns.
  - Status—look for icons other than the Normal icon. A sequence event can be used to set the status of a sequence. APM Administrators define and manage sequence analyzers.
  - Events—look for patterns across all sequences. Did many users abandon the critical path at the same event? Why might that be?
  - **Duration**—click this column heading to sort the sequences from longest to shortest. You may want to investigate why some sequences were extra long (was it due to slow response times?) or very short (did the user abandoned the critical path or was the sequence terminated by an
  - Custom Fields—custom fields can help you understand the placement of a sequence within the user's entire session. The Initial Referer tells you which page the user visited before starting the critical path.
- 3 Select a sequence to investigate and click its Session Explorer 2 icon. The Session Explorer opens.
- 4 You can explore the sequence in the same way you explore a session. See Investigating issues reported during real user sessions.
- 5 If you suspect that poor performance is localized to a city, region, or country, you can create a map using the search results. In the search results, click Map . For more information, see Viewing search results in a map.
- 6 If many sequences reflect the same issue, it may be helpful to create a pivot chart that aggregates data for all users. Return to the search results. Click Pivot . For more information, see Viewing search results in pivot charts.

# Managing searches

In all the Search dashboards, you can save and rerun searches. You can also clear search results from the table.

### Repeating the last search

To repeat the last search performed in a Search dashboard, click **Search**. The search parameters appear at the top of the dashboard beside Search Description, and the number of matches appears beside Search Results. The matches (if any) are listed in the table.

### Saving searches

For the searches that you perform frequently, consider saving them. You can shared saved searches among people with the same user role. For example, an APM Administrator can create searches useful to APM Operators and share them by selecting that user role.


#### To save a search:

- 1 Define and run a search.
- 2 Click Save Search.

The Save Search dialog box opens.

- 3 Specify a name for the search.
- 4 Choose whether you want the search available only to you (current user account) or available to everyone with a specific user role. In the latter case, select the user role from the list.

6 To run the loaded search, click Search.

The search results display matches (if any).

### Running saved searches


Saved searches can help ensure that you run consistent searches. For example, you may run a search, find data issues, make a configuration change, and then want to rerun the same search. If you save the initial search, you can be sure that the second set of results reflect just the configuration change, not any inadvertent changes in the search parameters.

#### To run a saved search:

1 Click Load Saved Search.

The Load Saved Search dialog box opens.

2 In the row containing the search you want to run, click Load 📴.

The dialog box closes. On the Search Hits dashboard, the parameters for the loaded search appear beside Search Description. The search results are not updated yet.

3 To run the loaded search, click Search.

The search results display matches (if any).

### Clearing search results

To clear the search results in a Search dashboard, click **Reset**. This action also resets the Search button to the default search parameters.

### Defining match conditions for expert searches

You can create searches that return very specific results by defining match conditions. Match conditions enable you to search on almost any detail or performance metric.

When creating an expert search with multiple conditions, logical operators are applied depending on the specified conditions.

- When conditions match *different* details, a logical AND operator joins the conditions. For example, if you define a hit search using the conditions *City = Madison, WI (US)* and *Browser Category = Internet Explorer*, data must match both the specified city and browser to be returned by the search.
- When conditions match the *same* detail, an OR operator joins the conditions. For example, if you define a hit search using the conditions *City = Madison, WI (US)* and *City = Boulder, CO (US)*, only one of the conditions have to match. The search returns capture data originating from either one of the cities.

In a complex search where City = Madison, WI (US), City = Boulder, CO (US), and Browser Category = Internet Explorer, the search logic looks like this:

("City = Madison, WI (US) OR Boulder, CO (US)") AND ("BrowserCategory = Internet Explorer")

#### To add or edit a match condition for expert searches:

- 1 In the Match Conditions area of the Expert Search dialog box, do one of the following:
  - To add a new condition, click Add.
  - To edit a condition, click its **Edit Z** icon.
- 2 Specify the search criteria.

#### Table 18. Match condition search criteria

| Source        | Select the type of web traffic matched by the condition. For example, End to End Time, Request Field, Browser, and so on.  NOTE: The other fields change depending on the selected Source.                                      |

# Replaying sessions, hits, and sequences

Often it is easier to understand real user data when you can see the page your user viewed. Foglight enables you to replay interesting hits, alone or in the context of a sequence or session. The Replay browser lives in the Session Explorer. From the Replay browser, you can navigate among the hits in a session, see the pages and hit content viewed by your user, save sessions for review later, and export sessions to share with colleagues.

# Introducing the Replay browser

You can open the Session Explorer from any search result that displays the Session Explorer 🙎 icon.

#### To open the Replay browser:

- 1 In the search results, click the Session Explorer Session, and select whether to open the Session Explorer in the current browser window or a new window.
  - The Session Explorer opens. The active tab is the tab displayed the last time you opened the Session Explorer.
- 2 If not already selected, click the Replay tab.
  - The Replay browser displays the selected hit. The following image and table identify the elements in the Replay browser.

Figure 38. Replay browser



- 3 To work with hits, in the Selection pane, select the Captured Hits tab.
  - By default, the list includes HTML hits as well as hits for other resources, such as images, text, and JavaScript.
- 4 Click a hit to view its details and content.
  - The hit's details appear in the Details pane, and the hit's content appears in the Content pane.
- 5 To work with pages, in the Selection pane, select the Page Visit Order tab.
  - The pages are listed in the order in which the real user viewed them. For replay purposes, a page is defined as having both page data and HTML.
  - NOTE: Pages without HTML do not qualify for page replay. For example, applications such as Siebel, PeopleSoft, and SharePoint<sup>®</sup>, may contain pages without HTML. In addition, pages identified by user-defined URL classifiers may not qualify. In this case, use the Captured Hits tab instead.
- 6 Click a page to view its details and content.
- 7 To page through the user's session, select each page in turn or use the navigation arrows on the Replay menu.

- 8 If the session you are viewing is still in progress, periodically click Refresh to update the data in the Session Explorer.
- 9 Optional—customize the Replay browser.

# Changing how content is displayed

You can change what you see in the Content pane by selecting a different Display Mode. The following table describes the kinds of views available.

# Understanding what happens when content is unavailable

Sometimes content is not available in the captured data. For example, content may have been cached in an earlier session and therefore was not returned as a hit in the current session. Depending on how your APM Administrator configured replay settings, missing content may be shown as broken links, replaced with resources of the same name retrieved from the live web server (default), or replaced by static page resources. For more information, see the When Element Content not Available setting under "Replay settings" in the Foglight APM Administration and Configuration Guide online help.

# Using the Hit Inspector

The Hit Inspector shows content similar to the Hit Detail View, but within the context of a session. When you select a hit in the table, hit details and metrics appear below the table. As you review the details, you may want to collapse the views you are not interested in. Then you can focus on the details of interest. Click the Client Detail, Metric Updates, and Other Information links to view additional information about the hit.

#### To review hit details from the Session Explorer:

- 1 Click the Hit Inspector tab.
- 2 In the first column, select the radio button for the hit you want to investigate. Hit details appear below the table.

# Saving sessions

While looking at a session in the Session Explorer, if you find an issue that needs further investigation, save the session. You may also want to save a session to use as a baseline before performance improvements are made to a web application. When escalating an issue, include the names of relevant saved sessions. The person responsible for resolving issues can review the sessions in Foglight and use the session data to help solve the problem.

Saved sessions are shared among all Foglight users with the role of APM Administrator or APM Operator. When naming sessions, you may want to include your name along with other identifying information for the session.

CAUTION: If you have the role of APM Sensitive Data Viewer, the saved session may contain sensitive data. To avoid saving sensitive data, log in as a user that does not have the APM Sensitive Data Viewer role enabled. Saved sessions containing sensitive data can be viewed only by users with the APM Sensitive Data Viewer role.

#### To save the current session:

- 1 In the Session Explorer, click Save.
- 2 In the Save Session Name field, type a name for the session.
- 3 Click Save.
  - A message box confirms when the save file has been created.
- 4 Click OK.

# **Exporting sessions**

Because saved sessions are shared, anyone can delete saved sessions. To back up your saved sessions, or to keep sessions for future reference, export the sessions to a local drive. Exported sessions are also a useful tool for Dell Support to diagnose data issues. Sessions are exported in ZIP format.

CAUTION: If you have the role of APM Sensitive Data Viewer, the exported session may contain sensitive data. To avoid exporting sensitive data, log in as a user that does not have the APM Sensitive Data Viewer role enabled. Imported sessions containing sensitive data can be viewed only by users with the APM Sensitive Data Viewer role.

#### To export a session:

1 In the Session Explorer, click Export.

A message box confirms when the export file has been created, and prompts you to download the ZIP file.



2 Click Download and save the file to your local drive.

## Importing sessions

Imported sessions appear in the same list as all saved sessions. When naming imported sessions, you may want to include your name along with other identifying information for the session.

#### To import a session:

- 1 In the navigation panel, under Dashboards, click APM > Search > Saved Sessions.
- 2 Click Import.
- 3 Click Choose file to import.
- 4 Navigate to and select the session ZIP file, and click Confirm.
- 5 In the Session Name field, type a name for the session.
- 6 Click Import.


The Saved Sessions dashboard contains all sessions saved or imported by Foglight users with the role of APM Administrator or APM Operator.

#### To replay a saved session:

1 In the navigation panel, under Dashboards, click APM > Search > Saved Sessions.

# Viewing search results in a map

From the Search dashboards, you can gain a geographical perspective on the current search results with maps. Maps can help you visualize an aggregate detail by country, region, or city. For example, a map can help you answer a question such as "Given these search results, which cities had the highest number of errors?" Maps are available for hits and sessions.

TIP: If maps do not display in your browser—for example, if you are using Microsoft<sup>®</sup> Internet Explorer<sup>®</sup> version 8 or earlier—try using a different browser. For a list of supported browsers, see the *Foglight System Requirements and Platform Support Guide*.

You interact with a search results map in the much the same way as the Geographical Perspective dashboard. For more information, see Viewing real user activity from a geographical perspective.


#### To view an aggregated metric in a map:

- 1 Define and run a search. For instructions, see Searching APM data.
- 2 From the search results, click Map 📵.





# Viewing search results in pivot charts

Pivot charts help you to visualize the composition of an aggregated metric by pivot category, Request Referer, or Response HTML Title. For example, the default pivot charts can help you answer a question such as "Given these search results, which browsers had the highest hit counts?"

IMPORTANT: You do not need to enable pivot categories to generate pivot charts. Pivot charts are generated on-the-fly for the current search results based on captured data stored in the Archiver database. The resulting pivot values are for display purposes only; they are not saved anywhere. In contrast, pivot categories create sets of topology objects to store pivot values in the Foglight database for other purposes, such as higher-level views and reports.

You can quickly view a set of charts showing the aggregated values for the Hit Count metric by various hit, session, or sequence details, depending on the search results. You can update the charts to represent a different aggregated metric. You can also change whether you are seeing the highest value metrics (Top) or lowest value metrics (Bottom), and how many of each you see in the charts. By default, you see the Top 10 values.

#### To view an aggregated metric in pivot charts:

- 1 Define and run a search. For instructions, see Searching APM data.
- 2 From the search results, click **Pivot** [1].









# Managing published maps and charts

  - To view a map or chart, click its name in the list. A window opens displaying the map or chart view element. Close the window.

  - To delete a map or chart, click its check box, and click Remove.

# Creating custom drag-and-drop dashboards

You can quickly and easily create a drag-and-drop dashboard to customize the view you want to use for triage with a specific application. This can be helpful when you want to:

- Enhance or simplify your triage process for a specific application by exposing important components or notes for a specific application.
- Visualize your end users and applications in a geographical distribution.


For example, suppose you have a service that includes summarized data from a number of different locations, and you want to visualize this at-a-glance, relative to their geographic location. The procedures that follow walk you through creating such a dashboard, adding view elements for Real User and Synthetic transactions, and adding map components.

Figure 48. Example of a custom dashboard created using drag-and-drop components









### APM tile and view reference

This section contains reference information about APM-related tiles and views. Read this section to find out more details about the metrics appearing on these views.

Foglight displays monitoring data in views that group, format, and display data. The main types are described here.

Dashboards are top-level views that contain lower-level views. The dashboards supplied with Foglight, as well as those created by users, are accessible from the navigation panel.

Lower-level views in Foglight can be added to dashboards or can be accessed by drilling down from a dashboard. They receive and display data directly from the Management Server or from other views. Some views filter or select data that appears in other views in the same dashboard. Some are tree views with expandable nodes for selecting servers, applications, or data.

NOTE: If you build services for the SOC using the traditional Service Builder in Foglight (Dashboards > Services > Service Builder), you must manually identify and select the appropriate topology objects. The topology object names are provided here, below the image of the associated tile.



#### Overview of APM tiles

Foglight APM includes a tile view for each monitored domain. In order to populate these tiles, the appropriate Foglight cartridge must be installed and configured to monitor the domain or component. For example, in order to view the Application Servers - Java tile, you must install Foglight for Java EE Technologies and configure it to monitor at least one Java $^{\text{\tiny M}}$  application server.

The metrics displayed on a tile are specific to the domain, but the overall look and functionality of the tiles are common. For example, the following tile presents JMX data:
























Figure 63. Example of a Pivot tile view
























Figure 87. Example of the Synthetic User Performance detail view
